Essential Education Course List Working Group

Work Completed

- Worked from the current general education list to compile a list of courses fulfilling GE requirements
- Circulated an invitation to departments to make recommendations for whether and how their course(s) should be part of Essential Ed
- Made preliminary recommendations based on department information provided for new course designations
- Gathered department feedback on corrections or additions
- Assessed capacity of new E2 categories based on current courses
- Reviewed department second-choice categories to identify additional possible Communication-Intensive (C-I) courses
- Developed recommended guidelines/criteria for C-I courses

Next Steps

- Finalize & communicate the attributes for C-I classes
- Encourage units to design or designate additional courses that qualify as C-I

Essential Education Experience (E3) Working Group

Working definition:

Essential Education Experiences (E3) emphasize learning through direct experience, active participation, and reflection. Instead of relying solely on traditional classroom-based instruction, experiential education encourages students to engage in hands-on, real-world experiences to gain a deeper understanding of a subject or concept.

Association on Experiential Education Definition

Experiential Education?

Experiential education is a hands-on form of learning that begins with a concrete experience. After solving a problem, learners reflect on the process and are able to apply lessons more broadly to their lives.

- Immersive project-based or experiential learning




SHAPE Essential Education Minors Working Group
